



★ A Message from GFWC of Minnesota Jennie Award Chair, Sherry Wellman. . .

Although GFWC International and GFWC of Minnesota have many important awards, the "GFWC Jennie Award" is the medal of honor. It is the only national GFWC award that recognizes individual members for their personal excellence. This is an award for a lifetime of personal excellence. It is the highest honor bestowed by GFWC!

The Jennie Award recognizes outstanding performance as a volunteer through a commitment to club, a commitment to community and a commitment to family. It honors one very special clubwoman from each of the eight GFWC regions each administration. They are chosen by their clubs to compete at state, region, and international levels with the final honor bestowed at the GFWC International Convention.

Here's how to get started nominating your clubwoman -

- ✓ Learn everything you need to know by going to the GFWC website, www.gfwc.org. find the '2016-2018 GFWC Club Manual' and open the section on the Jennie Award under 'Awards, Contests and Grants'.
- ✓ Clubs should identify an outstanding nominee who demonstrates the qualities outlined under the manual's 'judging criteria'.
- ✓ Nominations should emphasize a member's entire lifetime of service.
- ✓ Clubs should complete and submit the official 'GFWC Jennie Award Nomination Form' downloaded from gfwc.org website's club manual.
- ✓ Along with the official form you must submit a (maximum 500 word) written narrative describing the nominee's club activities, participation in community groups and organizations (volunteer and professional), and commitment to her nuclear or extended family.
- ✓ It's important to submit supportive materials:
- Photograph of nominee (maximum 5x7 inches)
- two or three newspaper clippings about projects to which member contributed (does not have to have her name specifically mentioned)
- Letter of endorsement from the club president
- · Letter of endorsement from a representative of another organization

✓The nomination forms and all supporting materials including photographs, will not be returned. The nominee's packet of supporting materials should be written and presented <u>as professional as possible</u>, as it may be judged at different levels by influential community leaders. First impressions do count!

Clubs must submit their nomination form & informational materials before June 1, 2017 and must be mailed to:

Each state president submits one nominee to her respective regional president. She also forwards the name of her state finalist to the International GFWC Jennie Award Chair. Region-level judges will choose two from each region to be submitted to GFWC headquarters. One clubwoman from each of the eight GFWC regions will be selected for national recognition as a GFWC Jennie Award winner. All eight will be awarded: roundtrip transportation to attend the annual GFWC International Convention in St. Louis, Missouri in June of 2018 (note: winners are expected to attend the convention). A Medal of Honor and a special certificate are presented by the GFWC International President.

★ Karen Kaler, GFWC-MN Domestic Violence Chair has an important question for us. . . What is Elder Abuse?



According to the *National Center on Elder Abuse*, elder abuse refers to intentional or negligent acts by a caregiver or 'trusted' individual that causes (or potentially causes) harm to a vulnerable elder.

The most common categories of abuse are:

✓ Neglect ✓ Physical abuse ✓ Sexual abuse ✓ Financial abuse and exploitation ✓ Emotional or psychological abuse and neglect (including verbal abuse and threats) ✓ Abandonment ✓ and Self-neglect

Throughout the year, there are many holidays and observances that can provide your club with the opportunity to honor older individuals and raise awareness of elder abuse. These observances provide unique opportunities to engage public attention, enlist public support, and generate activity and involvement at a grassroots level. Elder abuse can happen to anyone – a loved one, a neighbor, and affects seniors across all socio-economic groups, cultures, and races. And it can occur anywhere –in a person's home, in nursing homes, assisted living facilities and in hospitals.

Just how big is the problem?

Although there has been relatively little research on incidence and prevalence of elder abuse, a recent study indicated that approximately 11 percent of US elders surveyed had experienced some type of abuse or potential neglect during the previous year. It is important to note that this survey did not include elders with dementia, a segment of the population believed to be at even greater risk for mistreatment, or elders living in long-term care facilities. (Acierno, R. et al. 2010. "Prevalence and Correlates of Emotional, Physical, Sexual, and Financial Abuse and Potential Neglect in the United States: The National Elder Mistreatment Study." American Journal of Public Health, Vol. 100, 292-297.) Research suggests that elder abuse is significantly under-identified and under-reported, and that as few as (1) in (14) cases of elder abuse come to the attention of authorities. (National Elder Abuse Incidence Study. 1998. Washington, DC: National Center on Elder Abuse at American Public Human Services Association.)

Who is at risk for abuse, neglect and exploitation?

The older population in America is continuing to grow and will burgeon between the years 2010 and 2030 when the "baby boomer" generation reaches age 65. By 2030, there will be about 72.1 million older persons, comprising almost 20 percent of the total population, nearly twice as many as in 2007. The 85+ population is projected to increase to 6.6 million in 2020, a 15 percent increase from 2010. It is estimated that elders throughout the US lose a minimum of \$2.9 billion annually due to elder financial abuse and exploitation. (*Elder Financial Abuse: Crimes of Occasion, Desperation and Predation against American's Elders.* 2011. MetLife Mature Market Institute.)

Here are some Activities that your GFWC Club can do. . .

✓Organize a candlelight vigil in recognition of "World Elder Abuse Awareness Day" (June 15, 2017).

✓ Host a rally on World Elder Abuse Awareness Day and invite seniors, advocates, spokespersons, and government officials to talk about the issues and the ways that citizens can become involved in prevention.

✓ Distribute elder abuse public awareness materials at a local sporting event, concert, or fair.

✓ Purple is the color that has been designated for elder abuse awareness by the International Committee for the Prevention of Elder Abuse. Wear purple at your activity in recognition of World Elder Abuse Awareness Day.

✓ Partner with a local nursing home for a World Elder Abuse Awareness Day barbeque or picnic. Include activities and food for residents and their families, staff, and the community. Ask volunteers to bring food and games to play and coordinate the activities with nursing home staff. Invite the press for added exposure and increased elder abuse awareness.

✓Organize a collection of robes, socks, pajamas, sweat pants and shirts that can be donated to senior citizen centers or nursing homes.

✓ Hold a community yard sale at a central location such as a senior center or church/synagogue with proceeds going to an elder abuse support group or community outreach efforts to help elderly in crisis.

✓ Organize a "Letter to the Editor" writing campaign to raise awareness not only of elder abuse but of the local resources that are available in your community on aging offices, and other organizations. Be sure to include contact information and hotline/helpline phone numbers as well as web addresses for relevant organizations.

✓ Clothesline Show: Sponsor a t-shirt design contest or activity with a youth group or scout troop. Ask contestants to depict the themes related to elder abuse. Display the shirts on a clothesline at a senior center, health fair, or other World Day event.

✓ Student Arts or Essay Competition: Work with your state Attorney General's office, Division of Aging, Department of Education, local newspaper, school district, or other organization to sponsor a similar contest on a theme such as: Why Should I Care About Elder Abuse? Use winning entries.

✓Organize a "Chore Store": Elders who still live in their own homes may be finding it more difficult to maintain their houses or need help running errands. Have a community group, senior center, neighborhood association, or faith-based organization develop a directory of members willing to share time or resources at no cost or greatly reduced fees (for example, lawn work, small repairs). Circulate the directory to elders who may need these services.
