

The Edina Federated Women's Club GFWC: Paying it Forward

We are each an equal member of our society and our community. Our purpose is to offer a helping hand, compassion and mercy, and to do unto others as we hope they would do unto us. Today, the Edina Federated Women's Club asks you to believe in this statement and join them in paying it forward.

The Edina Federated Women's Club was established on November 6, 1969, at 12:45 p.m. at the home of Betty Nichols of Edina. The founders were a group of strong and eager women who hoped to create friendships and strengthen their community through monetary support and volunteerism. By 1976 the club had reached 125 members who followed the motto: "Founded on Friendship & Strengthened by Service." It was written by the 1976 club president, Heather Randall. This motto became the cement that held the club together then, and is still the cement that holds it together today. Each woman who joins believes in the ideal that women who work together towards a common goal will join each other on a path of friendship and will give their community a greater life by sharing their own blood, sweat and tears.

The "Feds" as many know them, have participated in rummage sales, drug abuse programs, style shows, furnishing the ABC House, "Friendship Security" for senior citizens, puppet shows, and more over the past 48 years. Beyond event participation, the club hosts major community fundraisers. In 1971 the club launched their first large-scale fundraiser with assistance from all 54 of their members that year including then president Lynne Billings. The Santa House project became the major fundraising event hosted by the "Feds," known widely as an annual community staple that would carry on for decades; later ending in 2000.

For years, the women of the club transformed the clubhouse at Braemar Golf Course into a winter wonderland complete with Santa's home and town. The space featured a holiday boutique that hosted local crafters and their merchandise, a candy store, and a children's general store. Children and parents were awed by Mrs. Santa's kitchen and two 12' trees—one of which was covered in teddy bears for the kids. Jill Atkins, President, recalls three generations of her family who attended the event each year. Her two children eagerly looked forward to Santa House with excitement towards visiting with Santa and coming home with a wrapped gift. In 1985 the event was recognized when the Edina Federated Women's Club received the President's Citation Award for Private Sector Initiatives.

Rosie Gubrud, believes that as the times change, traditions must change with them. She says, "time marches on and the memory and impact of Santa House lives on. As children grow up, traditions will change to keep up with the members, their families, and current trends. New traditions and fresh ideas are welcomed with open arms by all members, and that's what keeps us alive!" A member since 1972, Rosie participated in the club's efforts at the annual GFWC International Convention, held that year in downtown Minneapolis with the purpose to build community and create friendships.

Fast forward to the years of 2000 - 2015, the "Feds" took on many challenges while serving their community, a recurring challenge being the changing trends in the community and the increasing number of roles that women take on. A solution to the changing trends was to celebrate today's world and remain open to fresh

ideas. In 2000, the club launched an upscale gala fundraiser that they dubbed "Feds Fest". The fests were held at the Interlachen Country Club and later in the Westin Hotel at the Galleria. Throughout the years, 13 events were held with themes ranging from Cabaret to Mardi Gras and included silent auctions, live auctions, dinner, and entertainment.

To date, the club's fundraising from annual festivities, etc. has totaled almost one million dollars! Their contributions have benefited Best Friends Boy Scouts of America, Camp Challenger, Children's Home Society, Cornerstone, Courage Center, Edina Battered Women's Support, Edina Crisis Center, Edina Historical Society, Edina Parks, Edina Police K9, Edina Teen Challenge, Girl Scouts of America, Hopkins Project (Sojourner Shelter), Minneapolis Crisis Nursery, Minnesota Zoological Society, Operation Smile, Potter's House, (St. Joseph's) Home for Children, and many more totaling more than 160 through the years. In Edina specifically, a major contribution by the "Feds" includes the construction of a handicapped accessible park within Cornelia Park. The club donated \$10,000. The park was opened in July 1995 and features a plaque that reads, "Cornelia Park Handicapped Playground; To enable them to enjoy as vigorous a body as human skills can give them. We, the Edina Federated Women's Club GFWC, donate this playground to all handicapped children."

Since 1975, the club's total membership has consistently remained in the nineties with 92 members today. These 92 women choose to remain active members of the club and represent those who have been in their place before them because they choose to continuously pay it forward. As the saying goes, a small cost for a rich reward. When asked what the club has given back to its members, current club president, Jill Atkins, answered, "It's the cohesiveness of the group of women and their ability to have such compassion and support for each other especially during hard times that's really special." Barbara Waterston adds, "These women taught me how to set an elegant table for a gourmet dinner, they taught me that as we go through life we have an amazing support system, and we get to embrace change in our community and evolve together."

As women and as community members, the most important thing to remember is that we must not lose our ability to bond, lift each other up, and better our community. The "Feds" are reminders to the Edina community that there are always others around us who believe in the power of friendship and the power of community service. In order to continue growth and prosperity locally in Edina, The Edina Federated Women's Club GFWC offers women of any age the ability to step into a warm, embracing environment where they can give back to the community while creating new opportunities for themselves. Today, the club offers a daytime meeting and a nighttime meeting to accommodate each member of the group, especially those who manage many roles throughout the day and don't have as much time to donate to an organization as women did when the club first began. At each meeting there is a new featured program with exciting speakers who offer valuable insight and their "nuggets of wisdom." The club offers women of all ages and backgrounds the opportunity to build friendships with others who share similar goals and hopes for their local community. There was lots of laughing and cheering at their many stories. Then five of the Past Presidents took the stage and shared their most fond memories and successes of their presidency. Last but not least, the committee



had a quiz contest. Members had to match up a 'fun fact' with a member's name and whoever got the most right answers won a prize. Who knew?... that they have a member that is related to Knute Rockne; or crossed the Atlantic on the Queen Mary; or lived in the Aleutian Islands; or climbed Machu Picchu; or that her childhood dentist was Rudy Perpich; or she got a letter from J. Edgar Hoover; and the list goes on and on!! There were scrapbooks to peruse and an exhibit of club story boards.

The party closed with Membership Committee Member, Betty Stensrud installing a new club member Irene Pieper. Betty was so happy to welcome her to the club, and presented her with a red rose. Also, club member Joan Haldeman was presented with her silver 25-Yr. GFWC Membership pin and a red rose. Currently, out of GFWC-WSWC's 79 members they have six 50-Yr Gold Club Members and twenty-four 25-Yr Silver Club Members!!



★ Pat Stevermer reports on our GFWC-MN Resolution getting adopted in Palm Desert!

It all started in 2014 when Carole Johnson, GFWC-MN Public Issues Chair, challenged our club members to read "The Round House" a novel written by Louise Erdrich. The story takes place on a MN Ojibwe reservation and tells the story of the injustice to native women who are abused and how justice is not served on the reservation. Many clubs took up the challenge and included "The Round House" as a book review during their 2014-2015 club year.

At 2014 Fall Workshop in Little Falls, it was suggested we have a speaker on the issue at the next GFWC-MN State Convention. The suggestion was wholeheartedly embraced by everyone, so, the Northeast District invited Jurisdiction Judge, Korey Wahwassuck from Itasca County to share her extensive knowledge about the Native American women's heritage and how they have been and still are being abused. Also, a committee was formed to create a resolution that they titled "Jurisdictional Perpetrator Loophole".

Moving forward, at the 2015 GFWC of Minnesota State Convention in Duluth, Judge Wahwassuck spoke to the membership. In addition, Suellen Brazil, our GFWC International Guest provided valuable information on all the steps to get a resolution written and to get it to an International Convention. The committee went to work to draft a formal resolution. Most of the work was done by email since the members were in all parts of our large geographic state.

At the 2016 GFWC of Minnesota State Convention in Ottertail, our Violence Against Women Resolution was presented and a motion was made and carried to send it on to the 2016 GFWC International Resolution Committee for consideration at a future convention.

Our resolution was acknowledged by the International Resolution Committee and was included in the resolutions for the 2017 GFWC International Convention in Palm Desert, CA as "015-020 Domestic Violence Awareness and Prevention". In fact, it was the only resolution recommended by a state! Along with Native American women, the committee added Alaska Native women to the resolution. With this one amendment and some slight changes in wording, I am proud to announce that our resolution was adopted!

Resolutions take a lot of time and dedication to research, write and finally reach the international convention floor for consideration. Many thanks go out to the club women who read Louise Erdich's book; the GFWC-MN Resolution Committee's commitment in creating the resolution; and to those who were in attendance in Palm Desert this June to vote for it. ★ A Message from Pat Stevermer, GFWC-MN GFWC Community Improvement Program Chair. . . Has your club created a Community Improvement Project? The program awards are monetary prizes (3 per state/5 nationally) each year. Any project that you do that addresses a specific unique need within the community can become a Community Improvement Project. Plan to collaborate with GFWC clubs, partner organizations, professional or other membership organizations, government entities or other non-profit organizations in your community.

A number of club projects in previous years would certainly qualify as a Community Improvement Project. Complete details are online in the GFWC Club Manual in the 'Awards, Contests and Grants' section. It would be wonderful to have at least three projects that meet the criteria for our state awards and one project can be submitted for the national awards.

The contest period is January 1, 2016 to December 31, 2017. A notebook with the narrative description and supporting materials must not exceed seven pounds or measure more than 15" x 20" in size. They need to be postmarked no later than March 1, 2018 to me, the GFWC-MN Program Chair. The state winner's notebook will not be returned but is housed in the Women's History and Resource Center (WHRC) in Washington DC.
