This international GFWC award program aims to enhance the lives of our neighbors around the world by meeting specific community needs and elevating our clubs' status within their communities. Any club can create a 'Community Improvement Program' Project and apply for an award. Think of a partnership to address your community need, assist with the leadership development, and raise GFWC's profile in your community. Collaborate with GFWC clubs, partner organizations, professional or other membership organizations, government entities or other non-profit organizations. Establish the project as ongoing as long as the need remains.

The 2016-2018 GFWC Club Manual has all of the detailed information for the Community Improvement Program Award. You can even fill out and download the application form right from the GFWC Website. The program period is January 1, 2016 - December 31, 2017. Entries are due March 1, 2018 to the GFWC-MN Chair, Pat Stevermer. Your club has plenty of time to apply for this award and Pat would like to encourage you to please send her your club's community project.

Along with the entry form your written narrative should include the following information:
Identify and define the community need.
Describe the project selection process.
Explain how your club engaged community support.
Define how the project is/was financed.
Identify the media support and process in which it was obtained.
Describe how you overcame obstacles.
Provide a list of your collaborating partners, including government agencies, other service groups, and professional organizations.
Describe your club's continuing role in the project.
Explain the project's long-term effect on the community.
Identify results and successes.
Describe how the project influenced changes in your community, i.e., increased awareness, willingness to work together, impact, etc.
Focus on your content.

Please note: Your project notebook with the application form, narrative and supporting materials cannot weigh over seven pounds or be more than 15" X 20" in size. The first place state entry will not be returned and it becomes part of GFWC WHRC.

The "GFWC-MN 2017 EMPOWERING WOMEN PROGRAM" is the perfect way to honor one of your outstanding club members. Every odd year, GFWC of Minnesota gives your club the opportunity to honor one clubwoman who demonstrates the unique quality of empowering other women and their club. This is your chance to honor her during the GFWC of Minnesota Annual Convention in Bloomington on Saturday, May 6, 2017. Also, you could honor her during your District Convention.

The following attributes best describe a GFWC Empowering Woman – She demonstrates outstanding contributions to your club and its projects. She exhibits significant leadership qualities and the ability to encourage others to develop their leadership skills. She always portrays a positive attitude and a willingness to empower others.

Please write a brief half-page description of your Empowering Woman's contributions to your club and how she has empowered others. Be sure to include her activities at the GFWC District, State or International levels. Please include a photo suitable for reproduction. ★ GFWC Minnesotans Enjoyed the Mississippi Valley Regional Conference September 22 – 25 In Excelsior Springs, MO



In the caves below Kansas City, MO, GFWC members volunteered for a non-profit organization called "Giving the Basics." Did you know government food stamps won't buy shampoo, deodorant, toothbrushes, toothpaste, toilet paper and many more basic necessities of everyday living that we take for granted? 'Giving the Basics' tracks the need for these products and distributes them to more than 65 pantry locations and 186 schools in 14+ school districts, making the basics accessible monthly to 220,000 people. GTB products have a positive impact low-income families, students, battered women, veterans, seniors, former prisoners and the mentally ill. There products help children attend school feeling fresh so they are comfortable in a learning environment and they assure adults have the dignity they need so they can gain employment. GFWC members spent time boxing items, labeling boxes, and delivering boxes to the appropriate sections in the warehouse.



When the members volunteer service was done at Giving to Basics, they enjoyed a brief bus tour of downtown Kansas City and had a delicious lunch. Then it was onward to the Bingham Waggoner Estate in Independence, MO. They toured the Bingham Waggoner (20) room mansion (90% of the furniture is original to the house and nothing but the basement was off limits due to safety reasons). Later there was time for a quick trip around Independence where they ended their day at the Truman Library and Museum.

Saturday was a day of meetings. Our GFWC speakers and their topics were: Karen Kaler (MN), Membership; Bonnie Thom (ND), Domestic Violence Awareness and Prevention; Sandy Phillips (IA), Leadership; Tara Plasek

(NE), Advocates for Children; Karen Martinek (IA), GFWC Legislation & Public Policy; and Sheila Shea GFWC President, Communications & Public Relations. Sheila and Mary Ellen Brock, GFWC President Elect spoke about GFWC's Strategic Plan and 'GFWC Proud'.

The Guest Speaker was Kristen Moore from "Everytown, USA" (www.everytownusa.org). Everytown is a movement of Americans working together to end gun violence and build safer communities. Gun violence touches every town in America. For too long, change has been thwarted by the Washington gun lobby and by leaders who refuse to take common-sense steps that will save lives. But something is changing. More than 3 million mayors, moms, cops, teachers, survivors, gun owners, and everyday Americans have come together to make their own communities safer. In Memory of Past GFWC-MN President, Laurel Thurston Bessesen. Laurel Bessesen age 93, of Minnetonka, formerly of Edina, passed away Sept. 20, 2016. Preceded in death by her husband John and survived by two sons and one daughter. Laurel was born in Minneapolis, graduated from South High School, and studied art at the U of M. In 1939, she became one of the nation's first flight attendants and worked for Mid-Continent Airlines. Laurel and John

made their home in Edina and she helped run her husband's marketing businesses, wrote and published a cookbook and was a member of a GFWC Women's Club in District 5. District 5 merged with East Central District in 1990. Laurel was a GFWC District President 1974-1976 and from 1984-1986 she was named President of the GFWC of Minnesota. She often made the newspapers in the '40s, '50s and '60s because of her involvement in the community and in local charities. Along with GFWC, she was a member of the retired airlines attendants "Braniff Clipped Bees"; WCCO Good Neighbor; the DAR; and the Mary Esther Sunshine Circle assisting shut-ins and the needy. Laurel loved horses, figure skating, boating on Lake Minnetonka and driving her own Corvette. She possessed a divine sense of humor; a keen intellect, and didn't let much stand in her way throughout her 93 years. She will be remembered lovingly by the ones whose lives she touched.

GFWC West Suburban Women's Club (East Central District) honored the National Park Service's Centennial by having Teddy Roosevelt speak at their October General Meeting in Plymouth, MN. Posing with Adam Lindquist (Teddy Roosevelt re-enactor) L. to R. are Club Co-Presidents Marilyn Berdahl and Lois Tlusty. Lindquist adjusted his glasses, and instantly transformed into Teddy Roosevelt. With the upper crust, slightly English clipped tones of 1900, Teddy captivated us with his incredible life story. Lindquist finished with a stirring soliloquy about how Roosevelt was one of the truest of American heroes, a passionate advocate of peace, a brave warrior leading the Rough Riders, and a man who made decisions not on political expediency, but on the effects his choices would have for 3 generations. As Roosevelt said, *"No one cares how much you know until they know how much you care."*



2016 is the centennial of the National Park Service, and GFWC-WSWC's program was the perfect way to honor GFWC's long history of promoting conservation. From the Grand Canyon to the Great Smoky Mountains, the US is filled with breathtaking scenery. National Parks have so much to offer and play a vital part in preserving our natural resources. As the NPS marks their milestone, **GFWC has much to celebrate too.** GFWC clubwomen were leaders in the creation of the National Park Service and bound together to advocate for places people could go to enjoy nature.

As the American industrialization advanced in the 19th century, and urban centers swelled, Americans counteracted the effects with the reform movements that came to define the Progressive Era. **GFWC Women became the foot soldiers behind the battles for child labor laws, education reform, and the conservation movement.**

The wilderness was often viewed as a masculine territory, too wild for a lady of the time. However, that did not stop women across the nation from embroiling themselves in the fight to maintain America's natural landscape and resources, with the **General Federation of Women's Clubs leading the way at the local, state and national levels!**

Clubwomen of GFWC first began expressing interest in conservation in 1896. Advocacy for green spaces rapidly became a central concern. By 1902 we had created the Forestry Committee, the precursor to today's Conservation Committee. Clubwomen across the country became active participants in the fight for national parks, but three women standout as leaders of the movement. Lovell White, Alta McDuffee, and Mary King Sherman were lynchpins of the conservation movement, and among the most pivotal figures in securing the legislation that formed the NPS. All three women held active leadership positions within GFWC.

Mrs. Lovell White, president of the California Federation, led the movement to save California's Big Trees. When the Calaveras Grove was bought by a timber company, White organized women throughout the country in protest, stating the devastating effects the loss of the trees would have on California's ecosystem, and it's quality of life. Mrs A.D. Sharon, the California Federation's Vice President, appealed to President William McKinley, asking for a bill to interfere with the destruction of the forest. Although Sharon convinced McKinley to send an appeal to congress, the bill for protection was never approved. Consequently, White and Sharon managed to collect 1.5 million signatures, petitioning congress to protect California's trees. The petition helped to garner an appeal from Theodore Roosevelt, and marked the first time that a message had been sent to Congress by an organization that was entirely run by women. Calaveras Big Trees State Park was created in 1954, over half a century after White and GFWC California begin their quest.

Mrs Alta McDuffee's work with the New Hampshire General Federation of Women's Clubs also demonstrated how GFWC's conservation efforts operated in sync at the state and local levels. Working with the state of New Hampshire and the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests, McDuffe, GFWC New Hampshire's State President, spearheaded the effort to save Franconia Notch from being developed for timber. Under McDuffee's guidance, GFWC raised over \$10,000 for the campaign to purchase 6,000 acres within the forest. McDuffe's diplomacy earned the project an endorsement from the GFWC of Maine, as well as donations from across the country.

Perhaps no clubwomen embodied the ethos of saving the wilderness better than **GFWC International Past President Mary King Sherman**. Sherman was appointed the International GFWC Conservation Chair in 1914, where she strongly advocated for the establishment of the National Park Service. Nicknamed "The National Park Lady," Sherman's administration theme was aptly dedicated to the preservation of the American wilderness. Sherman became an instrumental force in lobbying in Washington DC for the creation of Rocky Mountain National Park in 1915, and represented GFWC at the dedication of the Rocky Mountain National Park. Sherman also campaigned for the Grand Canyon National Park and by the end of her service in 1920 as GFWC Conservation Chair she had helped guide the formation of six more national parks. Sherman tirelessly threw the full support of GFWC behind the creation of the National Park Service, which we all know became a reality on August 25, 1916. From 1916 to today, GFWC has continued our proud tradition of advocating for the formidable work accomplished by the National Park Service, and we are still promoting their conservation efforts. Thanks to the sacrifices made by our own GFWC clubwomen and those who care about our environment, there are now hundreds of parks nationwide available for people to visit and to enjoy the natural beauty of America.



Do yearly surveys to see what type of meetings your members want. Educate members yearly on the benefits of belonging to GFWC and their goals. Make sure your club members are subscribing to News & Notes and Clubwoman Magazine.

As you start your year each club should have a recruitment goal, do you have your goal set? Here is the recruitment goal for GFWC – A GFWC member who recruits: 5 to 9 new members receive a white star pin, 10-14 new members a red star, 15-19 new members a blue star, 20-24 new members a silver star, 25-29 new members a gold star, 30-34 new members receive a white circle to be worn behind the star pin, 35-39 new members a red circle to be worn behind the star pin, 40-44 new members a blue circle to be worn behind the star pin, 45-49 new members a silver circle to be worn behind the star pin, and 50+ new members a gold circle to be worn behind the star pin. ★ Send me the name of your club recruiter and the names and contact information of the new members and I will fill out the paperwork and order your pins from GFWC.

★ Sue Lemmer sends us news from GFWC Litchfield Woman's Study Club. . .

Our club has nine meetings each year, taking the summers off. This year we have scheduled a variety of programs for our meetings that includes speakers from our community. We also have planned a trip to the Paramount Theatre in St. Cloud and our annual luncheon at the Spicer Castle. The luncheon is an event where we invite prospective new members to gather with us and learn about GFWC and hopefully join our club.

Our October meeting was a 'guest day' at Peter's on Lake Ripley in Litchfield. This Our speaker was Karla Rick, who year we had seven guests in attendance. organizes "The Hope for Our City" that distributes food in Litchfield every Wednesday. Mostly donated food is trucked to Willmar and from there distributed to about 30 different towns. Karla and her husband transport the food in a 26' trailer from Willmar to to Litchfield where volunteers unload the truck and bag over 325 individual shares for distribution. A share of food can be purchased in advance for \$2 and there are no income guidelines to purchase a share. The items that are included in the share vary each week and usually consist of four to seven items that include bread, fruits, vegetables, canned goods, dairy, and sometimes sweets. It can also be items like water, duct tape or body butter. It is a new surprise every week! There is no advertising for this event, it is all word-of-mouth and it has really grown in the two years it has been held at the First Lutheran Church. It is estimated that the average household is 3.1 people and with over 325 shares each week that means over 900 people are getting help from Hope for Our City.

★ Sharon Medbery sends us news from the GFWC Progress Study Club of Browns Valley. . . This year's focus of study is the White House Cabinet Departments. So far we have studied the departments of Agriculture, State, and Attorney General. At the October 13 meeting, members had the rare experience of visiting with Carmen LeClair, who works as a Foreign Services Officer at the United States Embassy in Moscow. Officer LeClair's to mother, Jan LeClair, provided the technological expertise to make this possible. Also, Officer LeClair is the granddaughter of a long-time member and club Vice President, Phyllis Johnson.

Our community-based projects include hosting an annual bingo party at the Browns Valley Health Center, providing Christmas gifts to health care residents, and playing cards at the health center to provide funds for the local food shelf. Club members Carol Lenssen and Phyllis Johnson have been playing cards with health center residents weekly for many years.

Educational contributions include monetary donations to the Browns Valley City Library summer reading program, providing cookies and assistance to the library during National Library Week, and giving a reference book (usually a dictionary and atlas, respectively) to the Browns Valley Middle School spelling bee and geography bee winners.

A special educational project for the past two years has just been completed. It is an 'Oral History Book'. It was a cooperative effort between our club's
Oral History Committee and Browns Valley School's seventh grade class, along with the Beardsley-Browns Valley sixth grade classes of 1994, '95, and
'96. The project started with Janna Borgheiinck and Sharon Medbery obtaining permission from previous students to reprint interviews that had been
published at that time. The next phase was conducting classroom interviews of current local senior citizens. Our committee members generated a list,
contacted prospective interviewees, and worked with the language arts teacher to conduct the interviews. Following the interviews, students wrote
reports, which were then edited for publication by our Club History Committee. Once everything was ready for publication, the committee designed the
cover and arranged for the school staff to print the book. The final result was a wonderful well-received book of (99) interviews that was available for the
Browns Valley's Sesquicentennial Celebration in June, 2016.
