
GFWC Membership Quarterly

MEET THE NOMINATIONS FOR THE 2018 - 2020 GFWC-MN STATE OFFICERS




Jean Walker, President


Linda Blue, 1st Vice President

Diane Mangseth, Secretary



As one of their signature projects, GFWC Lac qui Parle Study Club chose to have club members purchase and donate new pajamas for women and children housed at 'Safe Avenues' in Wilmar. Pictured left is Coleen Anderson from Safe Avenues accepting all the lovely and cozy pajamas collected by club member, Marilyn Isfeld. Safe Avenues serves Lac qui Parle County and provides, among other services, emergency shelter for victims of domestic and sexual violence. Victims fleeing from domestic or sexual violence often leave with only the clothes on their backs. Safe Avenues has opened a location in Madison, MN too.

★ The GFWC Progress Study Club of Browns Valley had a busy year with their studies and volunteering! This dedicated West Central District club was founded and federated in 1900. The club has a long history of study and of home life and education volunteerism. The average age of their energetic three members is 74⅓ and the current President is Mary Hansen.

The club began its year of study by completing their 'White House Cabinet' Reports. The three club members set up a rotation schedule so that each member could study and report on five cabinet positions during the past 1½ years. Now that all fifteen cabinet departments have been covered, a new field of study has been launched: Liberal Arts Colleges in Minnesota. Colleges to be reported on include Macalester, Gustavus Adolphus, Hamline, St. John's, St. Olaf, and St. Benedict's. Roll Calls usually are directly related to the subject of study. Following each meeting, an article which contains a summary of the study club's report is submitted to the Valley News, Browns Valley's weekly newspaper.

As an important 'Home Life' project, the club Provide Christmas gifts to residents of the Browns Valley Health Center, a local nursing home. Playing cards with residents has been an on-going activity as well. The club also donated funds to the local food shelf. In addition, club members supported the Salvation Army Thanksgiving Dinner. All three members participated in the 'World Day of Prayer' too. This could be considered part of Education, but it was decided to include it in Home Life because it strengthens homemakers.

Educational contributions included monetary donations to the Browns Valley City Library's 'summer reading program'; providing cookies and assistance to the library during National Library Week; and giving a reference book (usually a dictionary and atlas, respectively) to the winners of the Browns Valley Middle School's Spelling Bee and Geography Bee. Also, they logged in many volunteer hours with the 'Literary Coach' tutoring project at the Browns Valley School.

These three ladies are a true inspiration to all the clubs in Minnesota!



★ Glenwood's Women's Club made the news in the Pope County Tribune!


GFWC Potpourri celebrated the year at the Bickle House

★ ONE LAST REMINDER from Pat Stevermer, GFWC-MN GFWC Community Improvement Program Chair. . . Has your club created a GFWC Community Improvement Project (CIP)? The contest period is January 1, 2016 – December 31, 2017. Any project that you do that addresses a specific unique need within the community can become a CIP. You can to collaborate with GFWC clubs, partner organizations, professional or other membership organizations, government entities or other non-profit organizations in your community. A notebook with the narrative description and supporting materials must not exceed seven pounds or measure more than 15" x 20" in size. They need to be postmarked no later than March 1, 2018 to me, the GFWC-MN Program Chair. I have already received one entry and I would love to receive more, so don't delay getting them in the mail. Good luck to all the clubs that made the extra effort to plan and complete a local project, that is what CIP is all about! A panel of judges will determine our state

winners. Please note: The state winner's notebooks will not be returned to you and will be housed in the Women's History and Resource Center (WHRC) in Washington DC., so don't forget to make a second copy for your club archives!

✓ The program awards are monetary prizes (3 per state/5 nationally) each year. Complete details are online in the GFWC Club Manual in the 'Awards, Contests and Grants' section. It would be wonderful to have at least three projects that meet the criteria for our state awards and one project can be submitted for the national awards.

Project selection – 25 points Project development – 50 point Project evaluation - 25 points
